

Presentation to Garner Town Council November 28, 2023

PURPOSE OF THE PRESENTATION

- Provide information about options for a future public art program in Garner
- Obtain Town Council direction on option(s) to pursue for next steps

PUBLIC ART DEFINITION

"Simply put public art is art in public spaces. The term "public art" may conjure images of historic bronze statues of a soldier on horseback in a park. Today, public art can take a wide range of forms, sizes, and scales—and can be temporary or permanent. It often interprets the history of the place, its people, and perhaps addresses a social or environmental issue. Public art can include murals, sculpture, memorials, integrated architectural or landscape architectural work, community art, digital new media, and even performances and festivals."

TEMPORARY AND / OR PERMANENT

Temporary:

- Projects that have a limited timeframe (a month, a year)
- Existing works or new commissions
- Variable scale and materials
- Location can change from year-to-year

Permanent:

- Life expectancy 20+ years (same as a building or other capital asset)
- Purchase an existing work or commission new work
- Variable scale but higher level of materials
- Location in publicly-owned facility/land

FUNDING OPTIONS

Annual Allocation

 A flexible amount that is allocated on an annual basis to commission public art projects.

Percent for Art

- Policy that dedicates a percent for art of capital budgets to a fund that is then used to commission public art projects.
- Since capital budgets are often funded through bonds, percent for art funds are typically used for permanent projects.

Impact Fees

 Policy that requires private development to include public art or pay a fee-in-lieu to a public fund.

Donations / Sponsorships

Private funding and grants used for public art.

GOVERNANCE

Policies

- Contract authority
- State Procurement Regulations
- Copyright
- Visual Artists Rights Act of 1990 (VARA)

Decision-making process

- Delegate selection to a Citizen Committee
- Delegate selection to staff / trained Curator
- Governing body makes decision

Resources

- Staff
- Operating funds
- Capital funds for permanent art / commissions

VISUAL ARTISTS RIGHTS ACT OF 1990

- Federal law that grants authors of works that fall under the protection of the Act certain rights beyond copyright
- Right to claim authorship
- Right to prevent the use of one's name on any work the author did not create
- Right to prevent use of one's name on any work that has been distorted, mutilated, or modified in a way that would be prejudicial to the author's honor or reputation
- Right to prevent distortion, mutilation, or modification that would prejudice the author's honor or reputation
- VARA rights can be waived by contract

TEMPORARY PUBLIC ART

- Determine location(s) and approval process
- Establish parameters for project (theme, materials, community engagement, risk and insurance, contracts, stipends, costs of installation, security, coordination)
- Examples of this type of program in Apex, Cary, Clayton, and other Triangle area municipalities

PERMANENT PUBLIC ART

- Develop ordinance and policies to establish program
 - Funding mechanism and governance
 - Criteria, parameters, process, maintenance, disposal, etc.
- Examples of this type of program in the Triangle include City of Raleigh (1%), City of Durham (up to 1%), Town of Chapel Hill (1% or another amount)
