KEYNOTE SPEAKER Rev. Dr. Byron A. Wade

Rev. Dr. Byron A. Wade was born in Los Angeles, California. He earned his undergraduate degree at the University Redlands in California and holds a Master of Arts from the Presbyterian School of Christian Education, a Master of Divinity from Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary and a Doctorate of Ministry from the McCormick Theological Seminary. Rev. Dr. Wade is married to Regina Fleming Wade, a North Carolina native, and they have a son, Andrew. His first pastorate is Davie Street Presbyterian Church. He is an active member of New Hope Presbytery, filling many positions within its structure including Vice-Moderator, Committee on Preparation for Ministry; Moderator, Black Caucus, Moderator, Committee on Examinations. On the national level he has been a part of the Black Presbyterian Caucus and served as the Vice Moderator for the Presbyterian Church USA. Rev. Dr. Wade has been on mission trips both to Central America and Haiti.



GREETINGS FROM Congressman David Price

David Price represents North Carolina's Fourth District – a rapidly growing, research-and-education-focused district that includes parts of Orange, Durham, and Wake counties. He received his undergraduate degree at UNC-Chapel Hill and went on to Yale University to earn a Bachelor of Divinity and Ph.D. in Political Science. Before he began serving in Congress in 1987, Price was a professor of Political Science and Public Policy at Duke University. He is the author of four books on Congress and the American political system. Price currently serves on the House Appropriations Committee and is the ranking member of the Transportation, Housing and Urban Appropriations Subcommittee. He is also a member of the Appropriations subcommittees covering homeland security, State Department, and foreign operations funding. He is a recognized leader in foreign Policy, co-chairing the House Democracy Partnership, which he initiated to help strengthen

parliaments in emerging democracies. In North Carolina, David's constituents know him as a strong supporter of education, accessible health care, affordable housing, clean air and water, and improved transportation alternatives. David is a native of Erwin, Tennessee. He and his wife Lisa live in Chapel Hill and are parents of two children and proud grandparents of a grandson born in 2006 and a granddaughter born in 2009.

He also received the 2018 Entrepreneurship/Business Award at the Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Incorporated Chi Xi Zeta Chapter at the 9th Annual Finer Womanhood Brunch. He has been attending the Legal Eagle Law Camp at NCCU for the last four years and also attended Fred D. Gray Institute of Law, Justice and Society Law Camp at Lipscomb University in Nashville TN for the last two years. Donovan's future goal is to be an attorney where he can help people and give back. He is also a young entrepreneur with his own business, Macktruck Entertainment, where he is known as DJ Macktruck. He is the son of Charles and Sarah Summers. He is a junior at Garner Magnet High School. While attending there he is on the Varsity football team and swim team. He also plays the trombone for the band at Garner High. 
She is an emeritus member of the Dr. Martin Luther King Annual Celebration Committee where she worked to promote the life and legacy of the civil rights leader throughout the community.

- 3. You should march if you have benefited from the economic, educational, and social remedies which are the results of Dr. King's life.
- 4. You should march if you have a sense of obligation to help others understand, merely by your presence, that the King Holiday is important to the Triangle, North Carolina, and America.
- 5. You should march if you acknowledge that the King Memorial March is not a protest march, but rather, an assembly of citizens from across racial and denominational lines, in a confirmation of solidarity with others who recognize the challenges still facing our society.
- 6. You should march if you wish to set a positive example for young people of all creeds and races by participating in a civic event which helps reinforce your values of economic justice, peace, and respect for all cultures.
- 7. You should especially march if you have never marched before.
- 8. You should march if you know ... deep down inside ... that you could/should do more to help inspire and provide a sense of aspiration for our youth.
- 9. You should march on Monday, January 15, 2018 if you and your family, or civic or church group come to grips with the realization that it is respectable to show support in public for a message which is still shaping the moral fabric and future of our nation.
- 10. You should march on the King Holiday because it is an appropriate and honorable response to today's realities and opportunities.



The lyrics are derived from Charles Tindley's gospel song "I'll Overcome Some Day" (1900), and opening and closing melody from the 19th-century spiritual "No More Auction Block for Me" (a song that dates to before the Civil War). According to Professor Donnell King of Pellissippi State Technical Community College (in Knoxville, Tenn.), "We Shall Overcome" was adapted from these gospel songs by "Guy Carawan, Candy Carawan, and a couple of other people associated with the Highlander Research and Education Center, currently located near Knoxville, Tennessee. "We Shall Overcome" serves as a powerful symbol of the civil rights movement and continues to function as a tool of solidarity and resistance.
